

What observers CAN do:

- √ Observers may keep notes, including marked voters lists.
- √ Observers may use an electronic device such as a blackberry or laptop to keep notes as long as it does not make noises, does not record the names of voters when being announced or disrupt the voting process. Additionally, they cannot be plugged in at the polling place.
- √ Observers may listen as the poll workers announce the addresses and names of voters appearing to vote.
- √ Observers may observe the election process.
- √ Observers may ask the warden for the number on the ballot box register.
- √ Observers may ask the warden to have the poll workers to repeat the addresses and names of voters loudly and clearly.
- √ Observers may challenge a voter's ballot for any legal reason.

What observers CANNOT do:

- X Observers CANNOT go beyond the guard rail.
- X Observers CANNOT talk on cell phones inside the polling place.
- X Observers CANNOT talk directly to voters.
- X Observers CANNOT ask the voters for their names and addresses directly.
- X Observers CANNOT talk directly to the poll workers (except the warden as noted above).
- X Observers CANNOT talk to each other inside the polling place.
- X Observers CANNOT wear or display materials intended to influence a voter including campaign buttons or signs inside the polling place or within 150 feet of the polling place.
- X Observers CANNOT interfere with the voting process in any way.
- X Observers CANNOT charge electronic devices at outlets in the polling place.
